Reception children have been diving into the past, exploring the fascinating world of castles while developing their musical talents by accompanying nursery rhymes with the glockenspiel. Year 2 artists have been busy mastering tints, tones, and shades, preparing for their exciting upcoming projects inspired by Emily Howarth-Booth and Pablo Picasso.

Year 3 children have shown incredible determination as they perfected their sewing skills, including the running stitch and overstitch, ready to create their own pouches. Meanwhile, Year 4 had a blast at their science workshop, where they explored the wonders of chemical reactions, with highlights like making slime and the exciting elephant toothpaste experiment!

Year 5 has been thinking globally through their new art project, creating map-inspired collages inspired by the works of Mona Hatoum. And Year 6 have tackled a wide range of topics, from the science of light to the history of World War II, all while honing their English skills by crafting suspenseful cliffhangers and exploring thought-provoking texts like Anne Frank's story and King George VI's VE Day speech.

Exploring the Past and Making Music!

Reception children have been on an exciting journey through history, learning all about castles and discovering fascinating stories from the past. Their curiosity and enthusiasm have been a joy to see!

In music, the children have shown their creative side, singing beloved nursery rhymes while experimenting with the glockenspiel. Their cheerful melodies filled the classroom, making this a truly magical week!













Year 1 Creative Computing and Storytime Picnics!

In computing, the children explored how following the same set of instructions can result in identical pictures, while creative freedom leads to unique outcomes. Using laptops and the Interactive Whiteboard, they practiced coloring pictures by following step-by-step instructions. This activity sets the stage for future lessons on writing instructions and debugging simple programs!

Meanwhile, storytime has taken a fun twist with a picnic theme! The children have loved sitting on a picnic blanket, selecting stories from a basket, and sharing their thoughts and ideas. This imaginative approach has sparked delightful discussions and a shared love for storytelling.



Year 2: Mastering Tints, Tones, and Shades!

In art, Year 2 children have been exploring the magic of colour! They learned how to create **tints** by adding white, **tones** by adding grey, and **shades** by adding black to a base colour.

These new techniques will soon be put to use as the children create their own masterpieces inspired by the styles of Emily Howarth-Booth and Pablo Picasso. We can't wait to see their artistic flair shine through in their upcoming paintings!



Interesting Fact:

Pablo Picasso was a pioneer of Cubism, a style that used geometric shapes to create unique perspectives in art. Similarly, Emily Howarth-Booth is known for her use of light and shadow to evoke emotion, making their techniques perfect inspirations for exploring tints, tones, and shades!











Year 3 Stitching Up Success!

Last year, Year 3 children have been hard at work mastering the **running stitch** and **overstitch** during their sewing lessons. Their dedication and enthusiasm have been truly inspiring!

Later this term, they'll put their new skills into practice as they design and create their very own pouches. We can't wait to see their creativity come to life in this hands-on project!





Interesting Facts:

Did you know that the running stitch is one of the oldest sewing techniques, dating back thousands of years? It's a skill that has been used to craft everything from clothing to intricate embroidery!

The overstitch, also known as a whipstitch, is commonly used to strengthen edges and seams. It's a technique often found in handmade leather goods and even in historical garments!

Year 4: Chemistry in Action!

Year 4 had an incredible experience at their recent science workshop, diving into the fascinating world of **chemical reactions!** The children were captivated as they witnessed liquids change colour, fizz, and even heat up during their experiments.

The highlights of the day included creating their own slime—an instant favourite—and watching the jaw-dropping **elephant toothpaste** experiment, where a foamy explosion left everyone in awe. This engaging workshop sparked curiosity and a newfound love for science in all the young chemists!





Interesting Fact:

Elephant toothpaste gets its name because the foamy reaction looks like toothpaste big enough for an elephant to use! It's created by breaking down hydrogen peroxide into water and oxygen using a catalyst.









Year 5: Mapping the World Through Art!

This week, Year 5 children embarked on an exciting new art project inspired by the works of Palestinian artist Mona Hatoum. Known for her innovative use of maps to document her journeys, Hatoum's art served as a wonderful inspiration for our budding artists.

The children explored maps and created beautiful collages featuring places they've visited or dream of visiting—locally and around the world. It's been a fantastic way to combine creativity with personal experiences and aspirations!





Interesting Fact:

Mona Hatoum's art often explores themes of home, identity, and displacement, using everyday objects and maps to tell powerful stories about her life and travels.

Year 6: Shining a Light on Learning!

Year 6 have been busy exploring a variety of fascinating topics across the curriculum this week!

In **science**, the children investigated how light travels, discovering the amazing ways it illuminates our world. In **history**, they delved into the causes of World War II and learned about Britain's efforts to defend itself from invasion.

In **English**, the focus has been on crafting suspenseful cliffhangers, using rich vocabulary to keep readers on the edge of their seats. During **reading**, the children have explored Anne Frank's story and King George VI's powerful VE Day speech, sparking thoughtful discussions about resilience and leadership.

In **maths**, the children tackled equivalents for fractions, decimals, and percentages, building a strong foundation for their problem-solving skills.



Interesting Fact:

Did you know that light travels at an incredible speed of about 300,000 kilometres per second? That's fast enough to go around the Earth more than seven times in just one second!




