Year 1 Maths Adventure: Comparing Numbers

In maths, Year 1 children have been busy comparing numbers. Starting with whole-class activities using objects on the carpet, the children then paired up to continue exploring. They used everyday items, cubes, counters, and numbers written in both numerals and words. The children also learned to use the comparison signs for greater than (>), less than (<), and equal to (=) to deepen their understanding of number relationships.



Discovering the Secrets of Seeds

Recently in Science, our Year 2 pupils took part in an exciting science activity, dissecting broad beans to explore the different parts of a seed. Building on their Year 1 lessons about plants and growth, the children observed how new plants begin to develop. This handson experience reinforced key scientific skills, such as observation, questioning, and making predictions, while revisiting the plant life cycle. It was a fantastic way to bring their learning to life!











Celebrating Our Uniqueness in Reception

In Reception, we've been exploring our differences, recognising that while we are all unique, we are equally special. We've had thoughtful discussions about belonging and working together as a team. The children had fun looking at themselves in the mirror and drawing self-portraits to add to our special display, showcasing the beauty of our individuality.





Activities like these directly link to the *Windows and Mirrors* project by encouraging children to reflect on themselves (mirrors) and understand others' perspectives (windows). Through self-portraits and discussions on diversity and belonging, children learn to see their own uniqueness while also appreciating the differences in those around them, fostering both self-awareness and empathy.

Year 3 Design Technology: Mastering Measuring and Cutting

In Year 3 Design Technology, the children have been sharpening their measuring and cutting skills. They had a great time creating straight angles, a key foundation in their DT learning. It's fantastic to see their confidence grow as they dive into these hands-on projects!








Exploring Three-Digit Numbers

In Maths, Year 4 have been busy exploring various ways to represent three-digit numbers. Using a range of manipulatives such as dienes, place value counters, part-whole models, bar models, expanded number sentences, and place value grids, the children gained a deeper understanding of the hundreds, tens, and ones place value units. It's been an exciting hands-on experience to strengthen their number knowledge!



Rights and Responsibilities

In PSHRE, Year 5 children have been reflecting on their rights and responsibilities. The children explored the Declaration on the Rights of the Child and considered what life might be like without access to the essentials for learning. We discussed the challenges faced by refugees starting at a new school in a new country. As a School of Sanctuary, they also thought about our responsibilities and how we can ensure our school remains a welcoming place for everyone.



Celebrating European Day of Languages

During the week beginning 23rd September, we celebrated European Day of Languages. Many of our children and teachers are bilingual which made the day exciting! We had fun trying to figure out the meanings of words from different languages, like how "Barbe papa" in French means "Dad's beard" but actually refers to candy floss. We also enjoyed reading stories in different languages and playing lots of language-themed games. It was a fantastic celebration of linguistic diversity!



Spreading Kindness with Our Nurture Session

In Year 6 during the children's nurture session, we focused on ways to show kindness around the school. To promote this, we're creating a special display of kindness monsters! Using a fun tutorial from 'Draw with Rob,' the children designed their own kindness monsters, each representing how they can spread kindness and positivity throughout the school.
